

My Greatest Save by Briana Scurry



Briana Scurry was a pioneer on the US Women's National Team. She won gold in Atlanta in 1996, the first time women's soccer was ever played in the Olympics. She was a key part of the fabled "99ers," making an epic save in the decisive penalty-kick shootout in the final. Scurry captured her second Olympic gold in 2004. She was the only Black player on the team, and she was also the first player to be openly gay. It was an amazing ride, one that Scurry handled with her trademark generosity and class-qualities that made her one of the most popular players ever to wear a US jersey.

Believe: the Untold Story Behind Ted Lasso by Jeremy Egner





Switching Fields by George Dohrmann





Britt-Marie Was Here by Fredrik Backman



With a narrative that includes player profiles and vignettes framed from team member perspectives, *A Greater Goal* illuminates the work, support, and grit needed to be treated with equality in a world that often undervalues the contributions of women.
