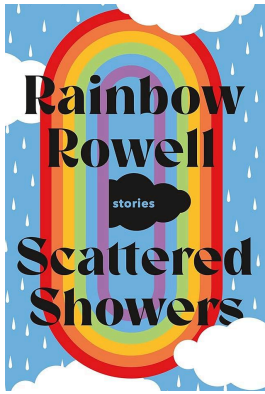

Scattered Showers by Rainbow Rowell

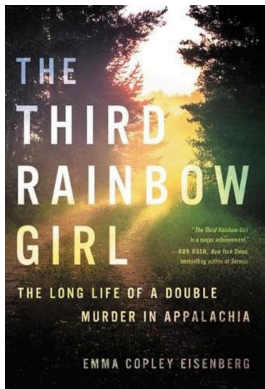

And Simon Snow himself returns for a holiday adventure. The Third Rainbow Girl by Emma Copley Eisenberg

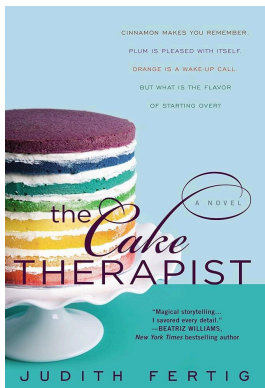

As time passed, the truth seemed to slip away, and the investigation turned neighbor against neighbor and confirmed the fears of violence outsiders have done to this region for centuries.

The Cake Therapist by Judith Fertig

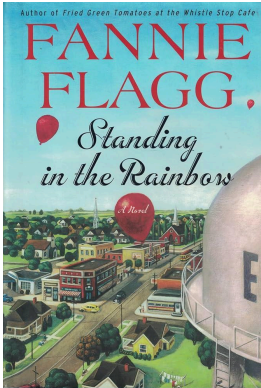

Craft the Rainbow by Brittany Watson Jepsen

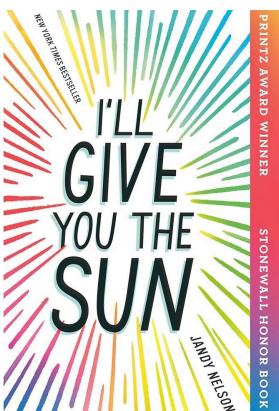

I'll Give You the Sun by Jandy Nelson

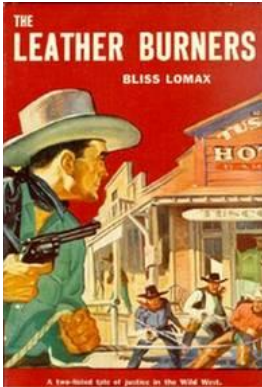

The Leather Burners by Bliss Lomax

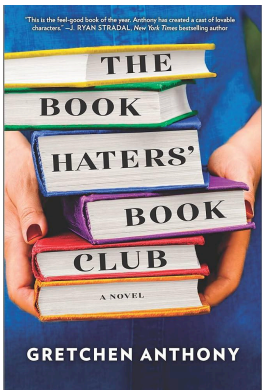

The Book Haters' Book Club by Gretchen Anthony

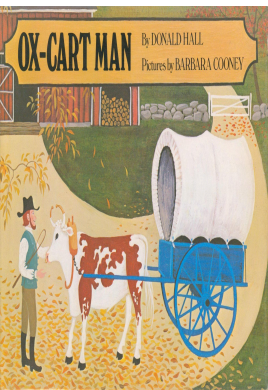
